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THE ATLANTA SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA'S DAY OF THE DEAD CONCERT AND FESTIVAL RETURNS WITH FREE COMMUNITY CELEBRATION ON SUNDAY, OCT. 29

ATLANTA – The **Atlanta Symphony Orchestra (ASO)** kicks off its new season of Family Concerts on Sunday, October 29 with a colorful program that will transport listeners to Mexico with favorites including *Huapango* and *Besame mucho*, with two performances at 1:30 and 3:00pm.

Surrounding the concerts, the ASO has planned a free **Día de los Muertos Festival** in the lobby of the Woodruff Arts Center and outdoors on Callaway Plaza, from noon to 5:00 pm. The family-friendly festival is open to the public and includes mariachi performances, Ballet Folklórico, stilt walkers, face painting, altar exhibition, traditional Mexican games and representation from various Latin American community organizations. There will also be themed food trucks with traditional food and drinks available for purchase.

"We are passionate about inviting our community to celebrate the vibrant culture of Atlanta through music," said Jennifer Barlament, Executive Director of the ASO. "Our inaugural Dia de los Muertos Festival last year was so much fun and attracted so many people that we knew our season would not be complete without an even bigger and better festival, this time in coordination with our popular Family Concert Series. It's a perfect way for families to explore Mexican culture through music, dance, dress, and delicious food."

The *Día de los Muertos* concert is the first of three concerts of the Family Concert Series, which has grown so popular that the Orchestra has doubled the number of performances. This vibrant "Day of the Dead" musical program celebrates Mexican heritage by featuring a program of all Mexican composers and a loving celebration of life through music for all ages to enjoy.

In addition to the exciting musical selections, performed by the Grammy Award-winning Atlanta Symphony Orchestra led by conductor Pablo Zamora, Atlanta playwright Jessica Rosa Espinoza has created a dramatic narrative woven into the concert featuring letters to departed loved ones, celebrating family and life after death to bring out the true meaning of the holiday. Dancers from Alma Mexicana will add traditional Mexican dances to complete the sonic and visual spectacle.

While admission to the festival is free, tickets are required for both performances. The *Día de Muertos* concert will be performed by the ASO in Atlanta Symphony Hall at 1:30pm and 3:00pm on Sunday, Oct. 29. Tickets start at \$15 and can be purchased at aso.org/family and ticketmaster.com.
