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ATLANTA SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA AND GOETHE-ZENTRUM ATLANTA PRESENT A FESTIVAL OF GERMAN ROMANTIC MUSIC IN APRIL 2024

ATLANTA – The **Atlanta Symphony Orchestra** and the **Goethe-Zentrum Atlanta** present a monthlong festival exploring the German Romantic movement. Performances of masterworks by Brahms, Strauss, and Beethoven will be offered alongside free community lectures, chamber music, and more. Official festival events will be held at the Woodruff Arts Center, while other events from community partners will also be highlighted.

"Even the most timeless and beautiful works of art are the products of their times, their battles and changes, their aspirations, and their personalities," said Oliver Gorf, Executive Director Goethe-Zentrum Atlanta. "The German Romantic Festival is doing an outstanding job in portraying the period of German romanticism from so many important perspectives. Goethe-Zentrum Atlanta, the German Cultural Center for the Southeast, is honored to be adding a few notes to this masterpiece of a music festival."

The contributions of the artists from the German Romantic era have impacted the history of virtually every art form, and their importance cannot be underestimated. Most of the festival events are free and presented with generous support from The Halle Foundation.

"We are pleased to support this special partnership with the ASO and the Goethe-Zentrum Atlanta," said Foundation Trustee Dr. Eike Jordan. "Through this collaboration, we hope audiences will deepen their knowledge of the music, literature, and landscapes that influenced Brahms, Beethoven, and so many other great German artists."

The festival kicks off on Thursday, March 21 at 6:30 pm in the Rich Theater with a lecture to set the framework for the festival. *Notes on the Romantics* is presented by Boris Cepeda, as part of the Goethe-Zentrum Atlanta's popular "A Note on Opera" series. This lecture will introduce audiences to the operatic and symphonic composers that defined the German Romantic period.

On April 4 and 5, ASO Music Director Nathalie Stutzmann leads the ASO in a concert at 8pm in Atlanta Symphony Hall featuring Mozart's Sinfonia Concertante, which shines the spotlight on Concertmaster David Coucheron, and Principal Viola Zhenwei Shi as soloists. Rounding out the program are two works by Brahms—one the of the leading composers of the German Romantic era.

Before each of those concerts, there will be free chamber music performances in Symphony Hall at 6:45 that feature works by Mozart, Beethoven and Haydn performed by 14 luminaries of the ASO.

The following week, Maestro Stutzmann will conduct the ASO and superstar soprano Renée Fleming in an evening of works by Richard Strauss on Thursday, April 11 and Saturday, April 13 at 8 pm in Atlanta Symphony Hall. The program includes the German romantic composer's *Four Last Songs*, and excerpts from the operas *Der Rosenkavalier* and *Capriccio*.

Before those concerts, there will be two free pre-concert programs. On Thursday, April 11 at 6:30 pm the Goethe-Zentrum Atlanta and ASO will present *Myth and the Romantic Rhine*, an evening of Romantic music, theater and poetry inspired by Germany's greatest river. On Saturday, April 13 at 6:30 pm, bestselling author Andrea Wulf give a talk on the remarkable beginnings of German Romanticism, chronicled in her 2022 book *Magnificent Rebels*.

For the final week of the festival, Portuguese virtuoso Maria João Pires will make her ASO debut in Beethoven's sublime Piano Concerto No. 4. The program then stays in the German-Romantic vein with works by Mendelssohn and Schumann. *Stutzmann Conducts Pires + Beethoven* will take place on Thursday, April 18 and Saturday, April 20 at 8 pm in Atlanta Symphony Hall.

That week, the ASO will offer a number of free pre-concert programs. On April 18 at 6 pm, *German Romantic Literature and Music* featuring Dr. Peter Höyng of Emory University will show how the works of Mendelssohn, Beethoven, Schumann, and Strauss were shaped by literature.

On April 18 and 20 at 6:45 pm, the pre-concert chamber performance, *Brahms' Swan Song*, will spotlight Brahms' String Quintet No. 2 in G major, Op. 111, originally intended to be the artist's last published work. Concertmaster David Coucheron and other ASO musicians will bring this beloved and devilishly difficult masterpiece to life.

All these events are presented with major financial support from The Halle Foundation. Founded in 1986 by The Coca-Cola Company executive Claus Halle, The Halle Foundation exists to support educational and cultural programs and activities which promote friendship and understanding between the peoples of the United States and Germany.

A CITY-WIDE CELEBRATION with community partners

More opportunities to celebrate German Romantic composers abound in Atlanta throughout April 2024. On Friday, April 12 at 12 pm, the **Emory Chamber Music Society of Atlanta (ECMSA)** will present the Juilliard String Quartet, the Vega Quartet and pianist William Ransom performing Schumann's brilliant Piano Quintet and Mendelssohn's miraculous Octet at Emerson Concert Hall at Emory University.

On Friday, April 19 at 12 pm, Grammy award-winning cellist **Zuill Bailey and the Vega Quartet** will perform Schubert's glorious Quintet for Strings. The performance is presented by EMCSA at the First Presbyterian Church of Atlanta. Details can be found at concertsatfirst.org.

On Saturday, April 27 at 6:30 pm, **The Atlanta Opera** will begin performances in the Cobb Energy Performing Arts Centre of *Die Walküre*, the second epic installment of Wagner's *The Ring Cycle*. Tickets and more details can be found at www.atlantaopera.org.

Finally, the **Goethe-Zentrum Atlanta** will close out the month's festivities with its Annual Signature Celebration Event & Fundraiser on Sunday, April 28, from 4 to 8 pm. This year's event will be Rhine-themed, with a mystical program of fairy tales, music, food, wine, and more.

The Romantic Rhine Valley is one of Europe's most renowned romantic landscapes. A trip along the river is like a voyage into a fairy-tale land, with 60 picturesque castles presiding over the river from the hilltops and vineyards. Romantic composers, poets and painters were captivated by the Rhine's natural beauty.

Widely regarded as one of the great pianists of our time, Portuguese virtuoso Maria João Pires makes her ASO debut in an evening not to be missed. She joins music director Nathalie Stutzmann and the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra in Beethoven's sublime Piano Concerto No. 4. The concert stays in the German-Romantic vein with works by Mendelssohn and Schumann, including a

musical postcard from Scotland by the 20-year-old Mendelssohn. The *Hebrides* Overture paints an enigmatic portrait of a sea cave in the Inner Hebrides islands. And the Symphony No. 4 by Robert Schumann offers a feverish flight through intense lyricism and bravura.
