A Record-Breaking Season

Nathalie Stutzmann's second year as ASO Music Director broke sales records, with multiple sell-out shows. Atlanta audiences reveled in a season that offered classical favorites from Bruckner, Dvořák, Tchaikovsky; classical Indian music and gospel music; and world premieres by composers Chanda Dancy, Jonathan Leshnoff, and Joel Thompson.

Prize-Winning Work

The ASO celebrated its first Pulitzer Prize when Tyshawn Sorey's Adagio (For Wadada Leo Smith) won the 2024 Pulitzer Prize in Music. Commissioned by the ASO and Lucerne Festival, Adagio premiered in the U.S. at Atlanta Symphony Hall. The ASO docuconcert "My Boléro" with Nathalie Stutzmann also won a 2024 Southeast Emmy.

The **Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra** (ASYO) celebrated 50 years of training some of Atlanta's most committed and talented high school musicians. ASYO 23/24 highlights include:

- \$9.6M in college scholarships offered to ASYO seniors
- 10,159 audience members across 5 performances
- 75 ASYO alumni participated in the ASYO50 Alumni Celebration concerts

30 Years

The **Talent Development Program** (TDP) celebrated 30 years of helping to prepare gifted Black and Latine musicians to attend top music schools and launch successful music careers. TDP 23/24 highlights include:

- 900 hours of private lessons from ASO musicians
- \$1M+ in college scholarships offered to the program's three graduating seniors
- \$41,456 in summer scholarships from the Azira G. Hill Endowment Fund
- 2,300 audience members across 5 shows in 4 counties

7,665
